

# IN THE NEWS

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### World News

The Syrian civil war appears to be poised for escalation. Case in point, the US warned Syria not to use chemical weapons in its ongoing civil war [1]. This warning came as Syria was seen moving its chemical weapons components [2]. One report suggested that the chemical weapon, Sarin nerve gas, must be used within 60-days to be effective, else it degrades and must be destroyed [3]. However, the US options may be limited. Case in point, by one estimate, it could take tens of thousands of troops to secure Syria's chemical weapons [4]. Meanwhile, Syria appears to be using Scud missiles in attacking rebel positions near Turkey [5]. In response, the US announced plans to deploy two Patriot missile batters along with 400 troops to the Turkish border with Syria [6]. Interestingly, Iran warned against such a move [7].

In Asia, China's claim to the entire South China Sea is resulting in tensions with other nations in the region. For example, Vietnam is stepping up naval patrols in the area to protect its fishing industry [8]. Meanwhile, China warned Vietnam to stop oil exploration in the contested areas [9]. To make its point, China conducted one of its largest air force drills in the area [10]. What's more, Chinese military planes flew over the Senkaku islands controlled by Japan (but claimed by China) [11]. This forced Japan to scramble F-15 fighters [12]. While the West is ignoring China, the communist nation continues to advance its technology. For instance, a Chinese space probe returned close up pictures of the asteroid Toutatis [13]. Stated another way, China has the ability to deliver nuclear weapons anywhere on Earth.

Elsewhere in Asia, it appears North Korea was successful in placing a satellite in orbit [14]. The missile launch prompted condemnation from Japan and the U.S. [15]. This means, like China, they now have a capability to deliver their nuclear weapons anywhere on Earth. What's more, since sanctions were ineffective when dealing with North Korea, why should we expect Iran to be any different?

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### **Economy**

In another sign the banking industry is still recovering, Citigroup announced plans to cut 11,000 jobs [1]. Meanwhile, after a long pause, regulators resumed bank closures. For instance, the Community Bank of the Ozarks became the 51st financial institution closed this year [2].

The Labor department reported the unemployment rate at 7.7% but revised the number of jobs created during September and October downward [3]. While a rate going from 7.9% to 7.7% sounds like good news, the main driver is people that left the workforce. For instance, while 146,000 jobs were added, 350,000 people left the workforce and are no longer counted [4]. So essentially, the Labor Department took a terrible news report and declared it a good news story. While such approaches make for good headlines, the economy is still under pressure. For the week ending December 1, the number of first time unemployment claims was reported to be 370,000 [5]. For the week ending December 8, the Labor Department reported 343,000 first time unemployment claims and revised the previous week with an increase of 2,000 to 372,000 [6].

Back in January, 2009, Timothy Geithner clearly stated that China was manipulating its currency [7]. Yet, as Secretary of the Treasury, he has yet to label China as a currency manipulator. Had he done so, there would have been a number of trade practices applied to Chinese goods that would likely have saved many U.S. Jobs. As previously reported Treasury Department under Secretary Geithner, once again refused to label China as a currency manipulator [8]. Yet This comes as the US trade deficit with China (of October) set a new record high [9]. The China deficit for October was \$29.5 billion out of a \$42.2 billion total [10]. That is, 69.9% of our trade deficit goes to China. Clearly, the one sided trade practices are benefiting China at the expense of U.S. workers. It remains a mystery why Chinese jobs are considered more important than American jobs.

## Energy

ne problematic byproduct of energy consumption is pollution. However, while the US carbon emission fell last year to 2% to 5.9 billion tons; China increased 10% to 10 billion tons [1].
