China continues to advance its confrontational military expansion. For instance, for the second time, a Chinese jet nearly collided with a US military aircraft [1]. Moreover, one piece suggests Chinese troops will join their Russian counterparts in Syria [2].

Overall, the Russian expansion into Syria is accelerating. For example, one report indicates Russia is building two additional bases [3]. What's more, newly arrived Russian military aircraft are being used to bomb Islamic State targets within Syria [4]. So far, Russia has conducted over 60 sorties against rebel targets [5]. The Russian attacks appear to be targeting all rebel forces located in the northern and central parts of Syria [6]. Finally, one report indicates Russia, Syria, and Iran have established a military coordination cell in Baghdad [7].

le are now learning more about the information lost during the OPM breach. For instance, one report indicates China's hackers got fingerprints of 5.6 million federal employees [1]. This comes as China's government continues to be accused of cyber-espionage against the US. Consider, two researchers were able to identify one Chinese hacker by name and discovered his title "Thai politic expert" and

that he is member of the People's Liberation Army of China [2]. In response, there was speculation that the US would impose some penalties against China for its cyber-attacks [3]. However, the decision was made not to retaliate [4]. This decision came after China agreed not to engage in commercial cyber espionage [5].

Massive privacy breaches continue in the news. For example, due to a breach at Experian, 15 million T-Mobile customer's personal information may have been compromised [6]. Then a 2014 breach at Scottrade involved information for 4.6 million clients [7].

 Tomlinson, Lucas, and Griffin, Jennifer, Fox News, Russians, Syrians and Iranians setting up military coordination cell in Baghdad, September 25, 2015. Terrorism within Yemen continues against religious targets. For example, during the past 3 months, 6 religious facilities were targeted by terrorists, with the latest resulting in at least 29 dead [1]. The Islamic State (IS) claimed responsibility for the attack at al-Balili mosque; a bombing that took place during the Muslim Eid al-Adha prayers [2].

Elsewhere, the war against the IS expanded with France starting to bomb terrorist targets [3]. One assessment of the French attack was the IS training camps targeted were completely destroyed [4].

In Iraq, bombs killed at least 18 people in Baghdad Shiitemajority neighborhoods [5].

In Afghanistan, the Taliban made significant inroads by attacking the northern city of Kunduz [6]. A day after the city fell; the Afghan government was trying to retake the city [7]. Another development after the city's fall; the US started bombing Taliban positions in Kunduz [8]. China continues to internally

battle terrorism. Case in point, bombs killed at least six people in the Chinese city of Liuzhou [9].

O ne impact resulting from changing environmental policy is coal industry closures. As a side effect, coal stocks are experiencing wide market price fluctuations [1]. Case in point, one piece suggests the second largest coal company may be next to file Chapter 11 bankruptcy [2].

It's no mystery that China has proposed rules that favor its domestic companies over foreign [3]. This is part of the never-ending unfair trade practices imposed by China. Case in point, Cisco helped China develop its internet but now must partner with an upstart Chinese company in order to maintain a foothold [4]. Then China is trying to force adoption of a home grown operating system, called NeoKylin, to replace Microsoft Windows software [5]. Consequently, 40% of the PCs Dell sells in China are now bundled with the NeoKylin operating system [6]. To remain in the Chinese market, Microsoft is removing its Bing search engine for Windows 10 and will use the Chinese Baidu product instead [7].

The reasoning for partnering with local Chinese companies is the difficult regulatory environment and theft of trade secrets [8]. Concurrently, theft of intellectual property is a serious issue with US business trying to operate in China. Case in point, in Shenzhen, Apple has only one authorized outlet yet there are over 30 stores that look like Apple outlets [9].

For the week ending September 19, the number of first

time unemployment claims reported by the Labor Department was 275,000 [10]. Then for the week ending September 26, the number was 277,000 [11].

The number of first time unemployment claims does not tell the whole story. Case in point, there are 94.61 million Americans no longer counted in the work force; resulting in 62.4% labor participation rate (a 38-year low) [12].

Meanwhile, American companies continue to shed jobs. For instance, Caterpillar announced plans to eliminate 5,000 jobs by the end of 2016 [13].

Regulators resumed shuttering financial institutions. The Bank of Georgia became the 7th closed so far this year [14]. Then, the Hometown National Bank in Washington State became the 8th closed [15].
