uring this newsletter, much of the world focused on Russia [1]. This includes US military aid to Russia's foe, the Ukraine [2]. However, China continues its expansion of military capabilities. For instance, one report indicated China is conducting electronic warfare tests on artificial islands constructed in the South China Sea [3]. This comes as China launched two more 13,000-ton guided missile destroyers on July 3 [4]. What's more, one piece predicts that within a year, China will challenge the US by using a naval exercise in the South China Sea to temporarily close the area [5].

The FBI Director, Christopher Wray, warned that China is America's most significant intelligence threat [6]. Another piece indicates China is waging a cold war against the US using approaches different from those of Russia [7]. Meanwhile, China's rapid military rise is not going unnoticed. Perhaps the biggest challenger may come from Japan. Case in point, it is estimated that Japan has enough plutonium to construct 6,000 atomic bombs [8].

he race to keep software safe continues to rely on patch management. For example, Microsoft's Patch Tuesday addressed 54 vulnerabilities [1]. Then on July 17, Microsoft released an additional 27 security patches [2]. Adobe released patches to fix over 100 vulnerabilities [3]. Additionally, Oracle released patches to correct 334 vulnerabilities [4]. During the month, Apple patched 76 security issues [5]. Finally,

Cisco released patches to fix four vulnerabilities [6]. In recent news, there was a suggestion that a copy of files given to the FBI is equivalent to having access to the complete computer system [7]. There are separate issues here; does a copy equate to the original and does the FBI have the expertise to conduct forensics on a computer system. Starting with the second question first. Readers may recall back in the late

1990's we saw the FBI's Digital Telephony effort to dumb down digital telephone switches in order to make wiretapping easier. This went on to become law [8]. We also recall the San Bernardino iPhone episode that suggests the FBI lacks some internal expertise in computer forensics [9]. As for the first question, the laws of physics cannot be ignored. Signs of a strong economy continue. For the week ending June 30, the number of first time unemployment claims was 231,000 [1]. For the week ending July 7, the number of first time claims was 214,000 [2]. Finally, for the week ending July 14, the number of claims fell to 207,000; a number not seen since December 1969 [3].

On July 12, the Nasdaq stock index reached a new high [2]. Then on July 13, the Nasdaq reached another record high [4]. Finally, on July 17 the Nasdaq set another record high [5].
