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Security

uring 2018, reports indicated Russia was actively hacking the US power grid [1,2]. Now there are reports that the US may be hacking the Russian power grid [3,4]. From these reports, we can infer that state sponsors have an interest in cyber-attack capabilities against power grids. With this as a backdrop, on June 16, in South America, an electrical blackout left tens of millions in the dark [5]. While the cause of the blackout is still under investigation, cyberattacks have not been ruled out [6].

The cybersecurity firm, Finite State, reportedly found back doors in 55 percent of the Huawei hardware devices tested [7]. Note, that testing did not discover a back door in 45% of the devices does not mean the devices are without security problems. So as the world considers allowing China to dominate the fifth generation (5G) telecommunications market; a look at history highlights the risks. Consider the Rare earth element market. China aggressively and successfully targeted this industry giving it a near monopoly [8]. The result is China now uses the threat of cutting off rare earths to further its international policy [9]. In effect, China has weaponized its monopoly [10]. We highlighted the rare earth risk from China back in 2010 (Newsletter Volume 3, Issue 20, dated September 26, 2010). At that time, China restricted rare earth exports to Japan [11]. Such practices are not limited to China. Consider the decision to kill the Space Shuttle program [12]. The result was reliance on Russia for transportation. So far, the cost for Russian transportation has exceeded \$3 Billion [13].

The race to keep software free from vulnerabilities continues. For June, Microsoft released patches that correct 88 vulnerabilities [14]. This comes as it again appears that cyber-crime attacks pays. Vulnerabilities in software and systems allow hackers to extort victims. Case in point, the Riviera Beach City Council in Florida agreed to pay \$600,000 to hackers in a ransomware attack [15]. Then, Lake City, Florida, agreed to pay \$462,000 to fix a ransomware attack [16].

In Hong Kong, thousands of people protested against a China plan to send people to the Mainland for trial [1]. 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Iraq military bases where US personal are located [9]. Finally, reports indicate Iran shot down a US drone [10].

The trade war with China is causing some businesses to rethink their commitment to China. For instance, many Taiwanese companies are moving their manufacturing back from China [1]. Additionally, the US is importing more from alternate sources such as Vietnam [2]. The trade war is expected to further the exodus of industry from China [3]. In turn, this is causing additional pressure for the Chinese job market [4].

Overall, the economy continues to show strength. The S&P 500 stock index reached a new intraday record, the first since May 1 [5]. For the week ending June 8, the number for first time unemployment claims reported was 222,000 [6]. For the week ending June 15, the number reported was 216,000 [7]. Finally, the number of first time claims for the week ending June 22 was 227,000 [8].
