## Wuhan Coronavirus

As of December 22, there were 810,045 confirmed COVID-19 deaths in the US [1]. Stated another way, more Americans have died from COVID-19 under President Biden than did under President Trump. On the 24-hour period before December 24, the number of deaths due to COVID-19 reached 3,354, in spite of 62.38% (204,740,321) Americans vaccinated [2]. Moreover, the number of new COVID-19 cases detected has reached a record high [3,4]. Then on January 3, the US set a one day record of 1,082,549 confirmed new cases [5]. The new record was reached in spite of insufficient COVID-19 testing [6].

As a presidential candidate, Joe Biden promised that if elected, he would shut down the virus (COVID-19) [7]. After nearly a year in office, President Biden agrees there is no federal solution to shutting down the virus [8]. We can infer that the COVID-19 virus, along with variants, will be problematic for some time to come.

The real unknown is how many US deaths are tied to infected illegal immigrants. For instance, illegals crossing the southern border are not required to take a COVID test for entry into the US [9]. In turn this has resulted in significant numbers of infections at border detention centers [10]. To reduce the negative optics of detention, one report indicates tens of thousands of infected illegals were released into US cities [11]. So, the question is why would the President champion an open southern border. Traditionally, Hispanic voters have tended to vote for the Democrat candidates [12]. Perhaps this is the reason for the President's policy.

ccording to the Labor Department, 199,000 jobs were added in the US during December and the unemployment rate fell from 4.2% to 3.9% [1]. Meanwhile, on December 27, the S&P 500 stock index closed at a new record high [2]. The new year started with fresh record highs. On January 3, the DJIA and S&P 500 indexes closed at record highs; on January 4, the DIIA set a new record [3]. Meanwhile, the US Trade Deficit for November grew by 17.5% to a record \$97.8 billion [4]. In contrast, the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis reported a \$80.2 billion deficit [5].

The economy as viewed from unemployment claims remained optimistic. For the week ending December 18, the number reported was 205,000 [6]. For the week ending December 25, the number reported was 198,000
