resident Biden declared the COVID-19 pandemic is over [1]. This comes as over 2 million illegal ↓ immigrant encounters along the Southern border were reported during this fiscal year, with over 200,000 just in August [2]. Moreover, what is not know is how many others have illegally entered the US. Surprisingly, even when the illegal immigrants are sick, they are sill released into border town communities [3]. In effect, the open border policy ensures disease spreads to every part of the US. At the close of this newsletter, John Hopkins University reports 1,062,560 deaths tied to COVID-19 [4].

The open border is also the conduit for dangerous drugs. Case in point, so far this year the amount of illegal fentanyl seized at the Southern border is enough to kill eight time the entire US population [5]. So how muck fentanyl got through?

The Nord Stream pipelines, designed to transport natural gas from Russia to the European union, were damaged by hundreds of pounds of TNT [6]. The investigation indicates sabotage was the most likely cause of the explosions [7]. Investigators from Sweden report multiple detonations [8].

In Asia, North Korea launched a ballistic missile over Japan [9]. Immediately following the unannounced launch, Japanese officials urged residents to take shelter [10]. North Korea claimed the 6 missile tests were for self-defense against direct U.S. military threats [11]. Additionally, the Biden Administration expressed concern that North Korea may be planning another nuclear weapon test [11]. (Continued on page 2)

mages confirm that Rus-**L** sia is using incendiary devices on populated areas [1]. Additionally, Russia is activating some war fighters, within its military reserves [2]. In a move to solidify gains, the Luhansk, Kherson and partly Russian -controlled Zaporizhzhia and Donetsk regions are voting for admission into Russia [3]. This comes as Russian President Putin threatened to us nuclear weapons should there be any attacks against Russia [4]. The significance of the vote is to provide Putin with a justification for using nuclear weapons.

Meanwhile, the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Director William Burns cannot determine if the Russian threat to use nuclear weapons is valid [5]. Moreover, President Biden discussed the real possibility of a nuclear Armageddon [6]. Concurrently, the Administration is purchasing \$290 million worth of antiradiation pills [7]. Nevertheless, there does not seem to be any effort by the West to seek a peaceful end to the conflict. Moreover, the Ukrainian government appears cold on peace discussions proposed by Elon Musk [8]. Interestingly,

Russian media welcomed the Musk suggestions and appear ready to negotiate a settlement [9]. The question here is why is there no peace effort underway to defuse the situation between Ukraine and Russia?

n August, there were over ₹ 25,000 Venezuelans, 19,000 Cubans and nearly 12,000 Nicaraguans encounters at the US Southern border [1]. President Biden has publicly stated that it is not rational to send immigrants back to these countries [2]. However, these three countries have strong ties to Russia [3]. This comes as events in Afghanistan are forcing Russian Putin to warn the West, he will used nuclear weapons [4]. So will Putin use nuclear weapons or will he use some asymmetric way to pressure the US to back down in the Ukraine? With so many illegal immigrants coming from Putin friendly countries, how many are Russian assets? Consider, in 2006, Russian operatives used radiation poisoning to kill Alexander Litvinenko in England [5]. Additionally, Putin critic Alexei Navalny, was poisoned with nerve agent [6]. The Administration's open border policies are enabling the influx of terrorists and Russia aligned operatives. This will likely not have a happy ending.

n September 21, the Federal Reserve raised benchmark interest rates by 0.75% [1]. Following news of the Fed rate hike, the Dow, S&P 500, and Nasdaq stock indexes each fell over 1.7% for the day [2]. By the close of the third quarter, the three stock indexes closed below 20% of their highs, indicating a solid bear market [3].

One of the dangers in relying on the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) is they control supply and therefore price. For instance, the Administration is trying to convince OPEC+ (includes Russia) not to cut back on oil production [4]. However, the OPEC members agreed to cut 2 million barrels of oil production per day [6]. As this newsletter closed, the average price per gallon of gasoline was \$3.91 [7].

On the plus side, the employ-

ment picture continues to look good. Case in point, the unemployment rate fell to 3.5% [6]. Following the employment report, the major stock indexes fell sharply [8].
