The US critical infrastructure is vulnerable to terrorist attacks. Case in point, in North Carolina, two power substations were shot causing over 40,000 people to lose power [1]. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) has joined into the criminal investigation [2]. Additionally, the county impacted is under a state of emergency that includes a curfew [3]. What's more, there are indications of similar attack in Oregon and Washington (state) [4]. A question here is how many power distribution locations in the US are vulnerable to the same types of attack?

Meanwhile, the North Korean leader, Kim Jong Un, stated he plans to become the world's largest nuclear power [5]. Regionally, China does not appear to be interested in slowing the North Korean nuclear weapons program [6]. Adding to regional tension, the North fired artillery near the border [7].

he attacks in the Ukraine have come close to the Russian occupied Zaporizhzhia Nuclear Power Plant [1]. The head of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) warned of the potential nuclear risk [2]. In an escalation of the war, Ukraine forces struck multiple Russian air bases located 300 miles from the border [3]. The next day, additional attacks hit other targets within Russia [4]. As the war continues, Russian President Putin warned his forces may be the first to use nuclear weapons [5].

Ukraine War

By one estimate, the Ukraine has lost 100,000 war fighters and 20,000 civilians [6]. This comes as the Ukraine government claims only 13,000 dead [7]. Meanwhile, Russian forces are continuing to attack the Ukraine using drones. For instance, drone attacks were carried out against the port city of Odessa [8]. Iran is supplying Russia with many of its drones [9]. Additionally, Russia is seeking hundreds of ballistic missiles from Iran [10]. There are indications that Russian and Iran are becoming full defense partners [11].

It appears that Russia is attacking the Ukraine power grid [12]. While the damage is being patched, there are fears of a mass exodus of people as winter approaches [13].

uring October, 40 people on the FBI terror watch list were apprehended trying to cross the Southern Border [1]. It is unknown how many terrorists may have entered the US without detection. It only takes one terrorist to make headline news. Consider, the United States has experienced domestic terrorism. For example, in Colorado, a lone gunman opened fire in a gay nightclub killing at least 5 people [2]. In Chesapeake, Virginia, at least 6 people were killed during a shootout [3]. The suspect in the Walmart shooting was a supervisor employed by the store [4].

The US is not the only Western country confronting domestic terrorism. Case in point, in Germany, 25 people were arrested in a plot to take over the Government [5].

The Middle-East continues to see acts of terrorism. For example, in Jerusalem, Israel, at least one person died as a result of two bombings [6].

In Pakistan. At least 4 people were killed by a suicide bomber [7]. In response, Pakistan is demanding the Afghanistan government to stop the flow
