With the new year came terror withing the US Asian community. In Monterey Park, California, a gunman opened fire near a site of a Chinese Lunar New Year celebration, killing at least 10 people [1].

Perhaps the future of the electric grid can be seen in Pakistan. There, 220 million people were without power as the country faces an energy shortage [2]. It seems, power is routinely cut during off hours in order save money and the technicians were unable to restore power after shutdowns [3].

In North America, there were incursions by high-altitude balloons. In the first case, a Chinese spy balloon was detected over Montana [4]. Days later its was shot down off the coast of South Carolina [5]. It was later learned that the balloon included a signals intelligence capability to collect communications [6]. Then a second object was shot down by the US military over Alaskan airspace near Purdue Bay [7]. Finally, a third balloon was shot down over Canada the next day [8].

Meanwhile, China now has more Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) launchers than does the US [9]. What's more, North Korea showed off 12 of their Hwasong-17 ICBM launchers [10].

he speaker of Russia's parliament warned Western countries, planning to send powerful weapons to the Ukraine, they risk their own destruction [1]. Prior to the start of the Ukraine war, President Biden promised to shut

down the Nord Stream pipeline if Russia invaded [4]. Months after the Russian assault, some country blew up a section of the Nord Stream pipeline [5]. There is now a report that pipeline explosion was the work of the US [6]. If this is true, then the US has gotten closer to a shooting war against Russia.

February 24 will mark the first anniversary of the war in the Ukraine. The indications are the war will con-

tinue at an expanding rate. For instance, 500,000 troops and 1,800 tanks are massing [7].
