The race to shoot down unidentified objects continued. On February 12, the US military shot down a fourth object over Lake Huron in Michigan [1]. It appears that at least one of the balloons shot down belonged to a US hobby group [2].

The obvious solution to shooting down high altitude balloons may well be lasers. Other lasers are being deployed by military forces around the world. For instance, one report indicates a Chinese coast guard ship used a blinding laser against a Philippine counterpart [3].

Years after COVID-19 was first detected, there is more consensus that it originated from the Wuhan Institute of Virology in China [4]. The latest assessment comes from the US Department of Energy [5]. Additionally, the FBI also believes the source of COVID-19 was a lab leak in Wuhan [6]. In response, China issued a warning to Elon Musk (who now own Twitter), against sharing posts that promote the lab leak theory of the coronavirus [7].

Meanwhile, China continues to expand its military capabilities. Case in point, the communist giant plans to increase military spending by 7.2% [8].

On February 18, North Korea launched intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) that landed in the Sea of Japan [9]. The ICBM reached a maximum altitude of 3,585 miles and flew at a distance of 615 miles before impact [10]. Then on February 20, the North Korean military launched two additional ballistic missiles [11].

Ukraine War Enters Second Year

n February 24, the Russia/Ukraine war entered its second year of conflict [1]. One report suggests Russia is losing 824 troops every day in the Ukraine [2]. Another report indicates both side of the conflict have suffered 150,000 casualties each since the war started [3].

It appears that Russia is suspending its participation in the New Start treaty and might resume testing of nuclear weapons [4].

What's more, Russia is changing its nuclear weapons policy to focus on the US and those supporting the Ukraine [5].

The war in eastern Ukraine continues with ground forces engaged. For example, the town of Bakhmut is under continuous Russian pressure and is likely to fall [6].

In a further escalation of the war, there are more attacks on Russian soil. For instance, drone attacks deep inside Russia [7]. This was followed by saboteur attacks [8].

The fighting spilling over into Russia is making the conflict more volatile. On the bright side, China has provided a peace plan that would hopefully end the conflict [9].


The Consumer Price Index for the year ending January fell to 6.4% rate [1]. One of the consequences of high inflation is the increase is the increased cost of interest. Case in point, the 10-year treasury yield has passed 4% [2].

One thing that can drive inflation up or down is the cost of energy. To this end, it appears the administration is allowing the costs to go up. For instance, a leaked Department of the Interior memo concludes a lower royalty would spur oil development in Alaska's Cook inlet; but the administration favors the environment over economic gain [3]. This is the latest example of the President's promise to do away with fossil fuels [4]. As a consequence, inflation will likely remain a problem going forward.
