hina continues to build up its offensive capability in the South China Sea. For instance, one recent photograph depicts three type 094 ballistic missile submarines, each with 12 multiple warhead missiles [1]. The naval buildup is forcing China's neighbors into coordinated responses. For example, the governments of Vietnam and the Philippines agreed to cooperate in opposing China's expansion into the South China Sea [2]. Meanwhile, one of China's warplanes came within 30 meters of a Japanese military aircraft [3]. Expectedly, Japan's Prime Minister is siding with other nations critical of China's military aggressiveness [4]. Then a Vietnamese fishing boat was rammed and sank (by a Chinese fishing boat near the site of the Chinese oil rig)) [5].

The Chinese activities are resulting in an Asian arms race. Case in point Indonesia plans to increase defense spending to 1.5% of its economy [6]. Showing growing animosity, representatives from the US and China argued at an Asian security forum [7]. However, many Asian countries are worried the US is not really committed to challenging China [8]. Perhaps this uncertainty is why Japan continues to separate Plutonium stockpiles that could be used to build thousands of nuclear weapons [9]. What's more, many companies that relocated to China are now moving to Mexico because of problems with doing business in China [10].

In Afghanistan, while the US's stated policy has been not to negotiate with terrorists, it appears the US has been negotiating with the Taliban terrorist organization [11]. Case in point, a prisoner swap was arranged freeing 5 Taliban leaders in exchange for a captured US soldier [12]. This release comes after announced plans to remove the bulk of US forces from Afghanistan [13]. What's more, reports indicate the al-Qaeda terrorist organization remains a high risk in Afghanistan [14]. A question here is will Afghanistan continue to be a training ground for terrorists? Finally, the threats of al-Qaeda attacks on the US and Western nations are on the increase [15].

The FBI announced over 90 arrests in a global effort to combat the Blackshades malware used to remotely compromise personal computers [1]. The arrests indicate the scope of cybercrime activities designed to electronically steal.

Hackers are also targeting

public utilities that make up the critical infrastructure. Case in point, a password authenticated public utility's control system was hacked into [2]. As long as we continue to use passwords to authenticate, hackers will have an easy time gaining access. Then, hackers penetrated eBay's computer network; potentially exposing the private information of its 145 million customers [3].

Unpatched commercial software remains a serious risk. Case in point, one article indicates a zero-day Internet Explorer vulnerability has gone 6-months without a corrective patch

Terrorism

Terrorism in Africa continues to escalate. For instance, in Nigeria, two car bombs detonated at a crowded market and busy bus terminal; killing at least 118 people [1]. What's more, Libya has degraded into a lawless state [2]. It is so bad, the State Department urged US citizens to leave Libya [3].

Terrorism continues to plague China. For instance, explosives thrown from vehicles killed 31 in the Xinjiang region [4].

Americans are still under attack in Afghanistan, with two wounded in an attack in the Western part of that country [5]. Nevertheless, the terrorist organizations in Afghanistan are poised to achieve a significant victory. Case in point, the US plans to cut the number of troops in Afghanistan to 9,800 this year and to 4,000 by the end of 2015 [6]. What's more, as part of a 5 for 1 prisoner exchange, the US is releasing 5 high risk Taliban leaders [7]. We expect terrorism will quickly fill the void left by departing Americans.

For instance, Al-Qaeda now controls Fallujah, Iraq, a city US forces paid a high price to liberate [8].

Fallujah is not the only city in Iraq challenged by al-Qaeda terrorists. For example, a suicide bomber in Iraq attacked a Shia mosque billing at least 17 people [9].

Terrorists from the US are in the news. For instance, an American of Middle-East descent from South Florida was a participant in a suicide bombing in Syria [10].

Economy

In the last newsletter, we provided a reference that China was limiting imports of dairy products due to the excessive demand [1]. In contrast, tainted products from China receive no such restriction. For instance, the FDA linked animal treats made in China with thousands of sick dogs and three people [2]. Even after identifying the Chinese products as tainted, it's industry, not Government, that is taking action to limit imports. Case in point, after the FDA linked dog deaths to doggie treats made in China, Petco will stop selling the products [3]. Additionally, the World Trade Organization ruled in favor of the US claiming Chinese duties imposed on imported US automobiles was unfair trade [4].

For the week ending May 17, the number of first time unemployment claims reported by the Labor Department was 326,000 [5]. Then for the following week, the number fell to 300,000 [6]. However,

there was some very bad news on the economic front. The economy contracted 1% during the first quarter [7]. Meanwhile, the Columbia Savings Bank in Ohio became the 8th financial institution shuttered this year [8]. Then on May 30, the Slavie Federal Savings Bank became the 9th bank closed [9].
