The Middle East continues to be a flashpoint of military confrontation. In such a theater, one of the risks is using radio reliant systems that are vulnerable electronic warfare. For instance, one report indicates Russia is jamming U.S. drones operating in Syria [1]. This comes as the U.S. launched attacks against Syrian government targets in response to a poison gas attack [2]. Meanwhile, Russia is blaming Israel for an attack on a Syrian air base [3]. Elsewhere, Saudi Arabian forces claim to have shot down ballistic missiles and drones launched against Riyadh from locations inside Yemen [4].

In Asia, China's military continues to expand. For instance, in the South China Sea, Chinese President Xi Jinping was treated to a 48 warship naval parade [5]. What's more, the new PACOM nominee, U.S. Navy Admiral Philip Davidson, indicated that China could now control the South China Sea from its fortified artificial islands [6]. For example, on their way to Vietnam, 3 Australian warships were challenged by the Chinese navy [7]. In a partial response to Chinese space threats, the U.S. Air Force is accelerating in investments to counter the growing threat [8]. On the plus side, the leaders of North and South Korea met and promised to end the Korean War [9].

Failure to quickly patch vulnerabilities is becoming an ever more serious problem [1]. In response, companies large and small are trying to quickly release security patches. For instance, Oracle released security patches to address 254 flaws [2]. LinledIn released patches to correct an AutoFill leak [3]. Cisco released patches to fix a vulnerability within

WebEx [4]. Microsoft released patches to fix nearly 70 vulnerabilities [5]. Adobe released patches to fix 14 security vulnerabilities [6]. Juniper released over a dozen patches to fix security vulnerabilities [7].

From the previous list of vendor patches, clearly much vulnerable software remains. One vulnerability exploited by the poor state of security is ransomware. For instance, one report suggests that 39% of mal-

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ware attaches are ransomware [8].

Economy

For the week ending April 7, the number of first time unemployment claims was 233,000 [1]. Then, for the week ending April 14, the number of claims was 230,000 [2]. Finally, for the week ending April 21, the number fell to 209,000; a level not seen since 1969 [3]. However, all the news was not good. For instance, the GDP only grew are a rate of 2.3% for the first quarter [4].

Another aspect of the economy includes the trade deficit with China. It seems that China is allowed easy access into the US economy while the reverse is not evident. Case in point, many illegal shipments of the drug fentanyl have their source in China [6]. Cities such as Philadelphia have seen a one third increase in overdose deaths because of the synthetic opioid fentanyl [7].
